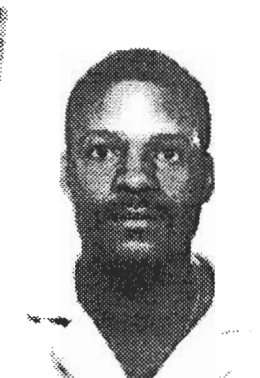
MICROWAVE JETS!

## YOUTH HOCKEY AT LEE VALLEY

In comparing Ice Hockey in England and North America I have found few similarities and find it difficult to compare the two. I am by no means down playing English Hockey, but strategically they go off in completely different tangents. When however discussing youth development programs you must go about them the same. This means learning the basics or as the old cliché goes, if I may, "You must learn how to walk before you can run!"

Since the departure of Wayne Evers in mid December I have been involved in coaching at all levels at Lee Valley. In comparing the youth development programme here and at home I would be lying if I said they were anything close to comparable. First and most important has been the lack of qualified coaches teaching our youth, enthusiastic parents and volunteers are very much needed and appreciated but when it comes to the ice sessions and one-on-one coaching, certain qualifications are a must.

In discussing the youth programme with parents and managers from the various teams they have also expressed their concern in this area to me.

Secondly and almost as important is the amount of time these young players are on per week. In order for players to develop at a rapid pace more than one training session per week is needed. In looking at the youth in the Lee Valley organisation there are some very promising players, looking at the group as a whole I can see the kids have tried to run before they can walk and this has definitely hurt their development. Translated this means they have failed to get the basics down such as skating, stick handling and shooting and gone right into playing games. I am a firm believer that skating is the most important skill in the game, and, if you can skate the rest will fall into place. Although I am not big on figure skating I must admit a year or two of figure skating can only be beneficial and I think it helped me out a great deal. Learning the basics can be tedious and seem like hard work at times, but once the foundations for these have been laid they are always there, but once again must be continuously worked on even at the professional level.

In closing I will stray from youth hockey and thank you, our supporters, for sticking by us through this season, which at times has been difficult for all involved. Loyal supporters are those who are there in the good times but more importantly there in the not so good times when you need them the most.

SOME FOOD FOR THOUGHT .....

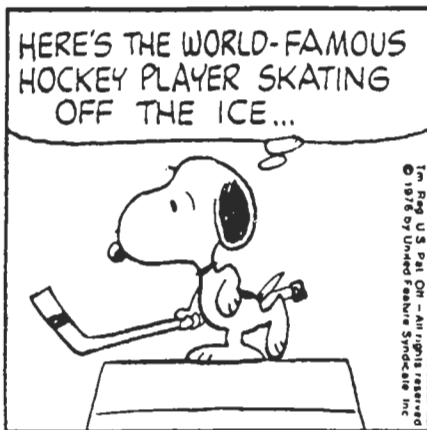
